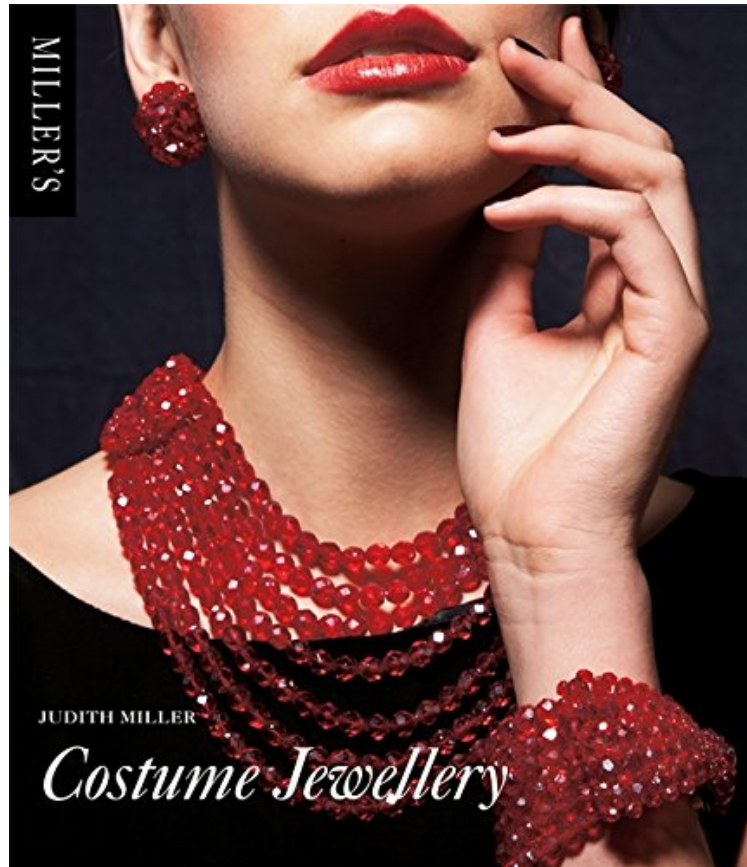

Eye candy with a big caveat By Sanda I am on the fence with this review because even though the book is beautifully designed (and printed) it has egregious copy editing, and is apparently loaded with factual errors. It almost lost me at "Wallace Simpson" but here's something interesting -- I got the UK edition of this book and Wallis Simpson is spelled correctly, as well it should be in Britain! I can only guess that they hired a terrible copy editor for the US version who was totally clueless and changed the spelling. That aside, it's amazing eye candy. I am not a collector but a designer, and from a design standpoint this book has gorgeous photography of mostly 20th Century costume jewelry and it's a great reference for me for the pictures only. If all you want to do is look at fabulous pictures this is, in fact, a worthwhile purchase. If, however, you're looking for factual information from a collector's standpoint apparently this thing is full of far more errors than misspelling the name of a notorious consort. I urge you to read the negative reviews of this book to find more information about the numerous factual errors. I found those reviews to be very helpful -- so much so that I've printed them out and placed them inside the cover as a cross reference. I don't care enough about the factual info to double check anything but I still enjoy

From Booklist*Starred * It's not often that a top expert in general antiques and collectibles turns her attention to a specific genre. Then again, this expert, Judith Miller, editor of the ubiquitous Miller's Collectibles Price Guide (plus dozens more), is a true aficionado of the art of costume jewelry. She shows her passion in this thoroughly documented and lavishly illustrated volume. Nearly 100 past and future designers are showcased here, prefaced with an overview of various decades' trends. Major creators, from Trifari to Haskell, receive at least a handful of pages each, with a few paragraphs about style and origins, close-up color photographs of representative pieces, and sidebars on critical features (for instance, rhinestones, vermeil, and setting). Classic designers—Napier and Rebajes, for instance—are spotlighted in a half page or so, while “like” collections (Austrian and double clips) are grouped and described. As for current prices? Miller occasionally references one or two—yet caveat emptor while simultaneously remembering Kenneth Jay Lane's dictate: “Wearing costume jewelry is like wearing glass slippers.
