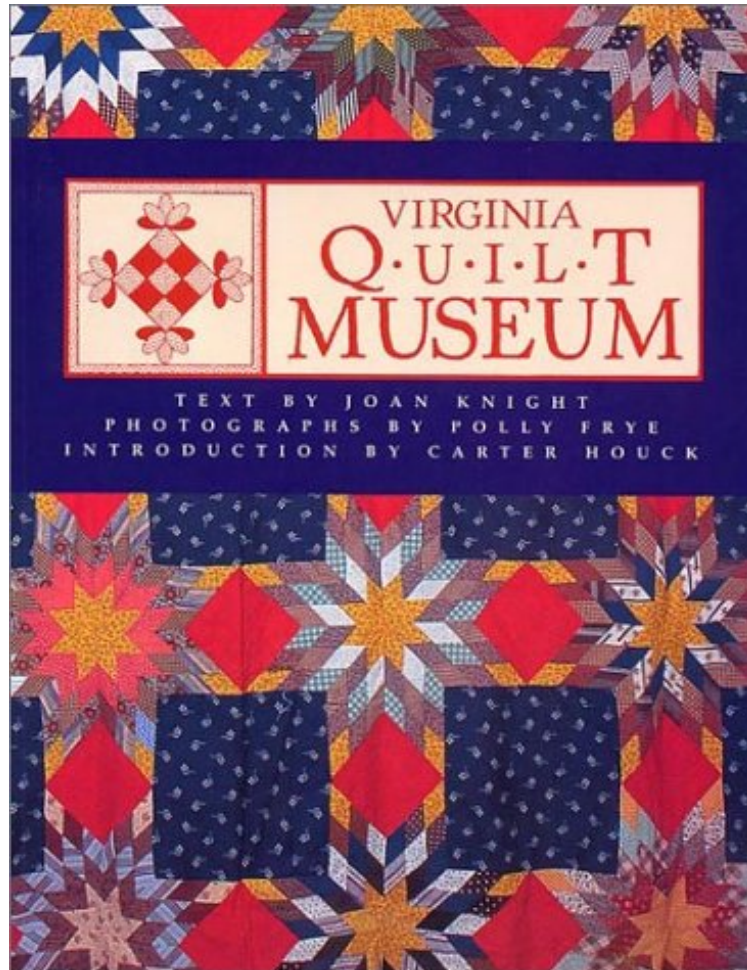

4-1/2" miniature quilt as well as a log cabin quilt which features a 60 degree diamond as the center, instead of the usual square). Glad to have this book!

Located in the historic Shenandoah Valley, the Virginia Quilt Museum is a resource center for the study of quilts and quilting in American culture. Included in the museum's collection are the creations of both early American and contemporary artisans. The comprises 80 examples of the museum's permanent collection, including Crazy quilts, Album quilts, Log Cabin quilts, quilts that show the German influence found in Shenandoah folk art, quilts that are uniquely Virginian in character, and more. Along with the 125 color photographs, 11 selected patterns are included.
